

Dear Parish Priest / Parish Secretary,

This year Prisoners' Sunday – the national day of prayer and action for prisoners and their families – falls on 13th October. Prisoners' Sunday is an important opportunity for us all to direct our thoughts and prayers to the needs of prisoners and their families, and those who work to support our brothers and sisters affected by the criminal justice system.

The number of people in prison in England and Wales is increasing and our prisons are in crisis. In our communities there are more children and families who have a loved one in prison and who may be struggling with stigma, isolation and perhaps hardship, as a result.

Pact is the national Catholic charity working to support prisoners, people with convictions, and children and families. Pact's work is deeply rooted in Catholic Social Teaching. Pact continues to restore hope and dignity to thousands of people affected by imprisonment. Staff and volunteers work in 68 prisons across England and Wales. Their care and practical support help people in prison stay connected with their families. We know that retaining strong family bonds is a significant factor in preventing reoffending.

In the pack accompanying this letter you will find more information about Pact and Prisoners' Sunday, including bidding prayers and a parish poster. I ask you to lead your parish in prayer on Sunday 13th October for all those affected by the criminal justice system. Together we can help prisoners and their families make a fresh start.

Please include the following in your newsletters the weekend of 13th October and the weekend before:

Prisoners' Sunday - 13th October. We will remember prisoners and their families at Mass this weekend. Prisons are in crisis and life for prisoners and their families in our communities is challenging. Pact, the national Catholic prison charity support prisoners, their families and their children, offering them hope and the chance to turn their lives around. There will be a second collection to support Pact's important work.

Pact's Faith in Action team have resources and opportunities for Catholic people to explore how they might respond to Jesus' challenge, 'I was in prison and you visited me'. Information can be found on the Pact website www.prisonadvice.org.uk

A message from His Eminence Cardinal Vincent Nichols

As President of Pact, the national Catholic charity for people in prison and their families, I invite you to join with me in supporting this year's Prisoners' Sunday, on 13th October. Pact supports people throughout



England and Wales, whatever their beliefs. Pact's work is varied, and includes care for children whose parents have been sent to prison, as well as offering practical assistance to people leaving prison, who are trying to make a fresh start and put their past behind them.

Pact workers can be found inside many prisons, working alongside chaplains, to support people who may be experiencing mental illness or losing hope. An important element of Pact's work is to support prisoners and their families to maintain their family bonds, recognising the anxiety, isolation and perhaps hardship they may be experiencing while a loved one is in prison. This work has been hugely influential, and it is now recognised that it is one of the most effective means to reduce the risk of reoffending by former prisoners.

Jesus himself commended those who showed concern for prisoners: 'I was in prison and you visited me'. Pact continues to rely strongly on the support of Catholic parishioners. I encourage you to play your part in its important work, whether through prayer, volunteering or financial support, putting the values of the Gospel into action and working for the common good of all.

Please hold a second collection for Pact this Prisoners' Sunday, or on a suitable Sunday of your choosing.


- Use the resources in this guide and on our website during your Mass on Prisoners' Sunday, to raise lasting awareness within the parish community.
